Dear Board Members:

The League of Women Voters believes our political maps should represent the people who live within them. To that end, we look forward to supporting your efforts in implementing a robust and transparent redistricting process. This letter outlines the League's recommendations for that process.

As soon as possible, the County should establish, implement and publish an outreach strategy to gather meaningful public input in developing the new maps. The delay in receipt of the final census data should not be allowed to impede this process.

The published outreach strategy should reflect the goals listed below:

- Protect and maintain communities of interest;
- Include at least one public hearing regarding the proposed consultant who will develop the map(s);
- Include at least one public hearing regarding the proposed outreach plan for the redistricting process;
- Ensure the consulting firm and redistricting process as a whole offers accessible
 online and in-person opportunities to provide input regarding communities of
 interest and the impacts of proposed lines, as well as other comments, questions,
 concerns, and ideas related to the proposed maps;
- Include accessibility approaches that remove physical, technological, language, and other barriers to public participation, including work schedules and family commitments;
- Include, for each of the five districts, accessible communication activities with opportunities for engagement before and after proposed maps are created

- Leverage the trusted messengers and communities of interest infrastructure used to ensure a complete 2020 census count, Municipal Advisory Councils, Interfaith Networks, and other existing network/neighborhood infrastructure to communicate about how and why to participate in the redistricting process;
- Provide adequate funding and personnel to accomplish these goals in partnership with community volunteers; and
- Provide meeting notices at least two weeks in advance, including notices of applicable Supervisor and Redistricting Committee meetings.

Finally, we recommend that the County establish a citizens redistricting commission or committee with a well-defined role and, further, that this advisory group follow the statutory rules for a Citizens Advisory Commission, namely, excluding any person who is an elected official of the County or a family member, staff member, or paid campaign staff of an elected County official.

We will promote the use of the Local Redistricting Checklist: For city and county governments of California, a Common Cause publication, in assessing the redistricting process.

My name is Maika Llorens Gulati, and I am a former San Rafael City School Board Member, elected District-Wide before the change to Trustees Areas. Last Fall, I was elected to the newly created City Council District 1. My experience moving from representing the entire School District to my Council District have given me a clear perspective on the differences.

My District includes the Canal neighborhood, California Park, Spinnaker Point, Bay Point, portions of Bret Harte, and the Lincoln Avenue Corridor. These are all neighborhoods recognized in San Rafael's General Plan, though the Lincoln corridor is combined with San Rafael Hill. There is a definite community of interest across these neighborhoods. More than half of my constituents are immigrants; they are younger, and earn lower incomes, mostly working in service industries. Three quarters of them rent rather than own their home, and two thirds of my constituents live in multifamily housing.

This District spans Supervisors District 1 and 4, making for a jumbled political representation. I recommend the Board look seriously at adjusting the lines in Central San Rafael so that this community is not split apart including Bret Harte. There is an opportunity to closely align the School District, City Council, and Board of Supervisors jurisdiction to provide better representation to the community I represent.

While drawing the lines, the Board must consider not only balancing population numbers but also 'communities of Interest' defined by State law as "a population that shares common social or economic interests that should be included within a single district for purposes of its effective and fair representation." I'd like to submit for your consideration a proposed mapping concept for Marin County's Supervisorial districts.

The link to the map is here: Core Communities ID: 71483 Marin County Supervisorial Districts from 2020 Blocks Updated 10/27/2021, 6:46:55 PM

Named "Core Communities," this map seeks to create Supervisorial districts based on groupings of communities with the strongest shared connections. Generally described, they are:

- Coastal Communities (Mill Valley, Sausalito, West Marin): these communities follow Marin's Pacific Coast from north to south. Mill Valley and Sausalito are already in the same district based on their community similarities, but both also share many interests and concerns with the communities and protected areas of West Marin (i.e. land management, fire hazard, and coastal flooding).
- Twin Cities + Tiburon-Belvedere: Tiburon and Belvedere are closely intertwined and are already in the same district for obvious reasons, but current maps overlook both the historically strong (and ever-strengthening) ties between the Twin Cities of Corte Madera and Larkspur. Furthermore, Corte Madera and Tiburon are connected by the Ring Mountain Open Space Preserve, a crucial local asset to both communities that links the Twin Cities with Tiburon-Belvedere. All four share both issues of fire hazard and flooding.
- San Rafael: as Marin's foremost city (with a population near the ideal district size) there is already a primarily "San Rafael district" for obvious reasons; this map cleans up and further clarifies that concept.
- Woodland Communities: Fairfax, Sleepy Hollow, and Saint Vincent share common lifestyles and land use
 patterns, as well as critical fire hazard. Grouping these communities and their environs into a common district
 allows reflects their common interests and challenges.
- Novato: as Marin's other major city (with a population near the ideal district size) there is already a primarily "Novato district" for obvious reasons; this map cleans up and further clarifies that concept.

This map and narrative are intended to recommend key concepts, but the exact locations of boundaries between districts (at the tract level) have not been carefully considered and are not intended as concrete recommendations.

As a Corte Madera resident and Councilmember, I do feel strongly that Corte Madera, Larkspur (including Greenbrae and Kentfield), and Tiburon-Belvedere belong in the same Supervisorial district. These communities are deeply intertwined both geographically and socially, sharing a common history and common interests.

This message is intended to describe some of the rational behind the map I previously submitted - Public Map 201. I realize the options presented in the map involve MAJOR changes, but I think they respect both incorporated city boundaries (and city council districts where they exist) and the major unincorporated communities, respond to some of the public comments expressed to date particularly regarding maximizing the Hispanic population in a single district, are very highly balanced (having only a 0.78% population deviation) and are far more compact (particularly regarding District 4) than the existing strange gerrymandering that goes back to the 1980 census redistricting.

Map 201 moves all of unincorporated Mill Valley (including the Homestead Valley and Muir Woods Park neighborhoods) on the Richardson Bay side of Panoramic Highway into District 3. Then, in order to balance the population between districts, moves the Ring Mt. part of Tiburon clearly defined by the major roads Tiburon Blvd., Trestle Glen and Paradise Drive from District 3 to District 2, and removes the "over Mt. Tam" spine of current District 4 and puts all of Corte Madera and the remaining parts of Larkspur (including Larkspur Landing) as well as San Quentin in District 2. In order to balance the population within District 2, it puts all of Fairfax (one of the main entrance points to West Marin - along Sir Francis Drake Blvd.) in District 4,

Most importantly the map moves the entire Cal Park, Bret Harte and Gerstle Park neighborhoods from District 2 into District 1 and removes the Canal neighborhood from District 4 and also puts it in District 1. With these changes all of south San Rafael (the 94901 zip code) and all of three of the four City Council districts are in District 1. In order to balance the population in District 1, the map moves the Terra Linda, Mont Marin, Marinwood and Lucas Valley neighborhoods (all of the fourth City Council district plus unincorporated areas) from District 1 to District 4 generally using the City Council district boundary along the SMART rail tracks. This area includes another major entrance to West Marin - Lucas Valley Road.

In addition, the map moves more of the western part of Novato (including all of Indian Valley) from District 5 to District 4 using Novato Blvd., McClay Road and the Novato City Limits line to more clearly define the District boundary while eliminating the current awkward division that exists within the San Marin neighborhood. This area of Novato serves as a third major entrance to West Marin - Novato Blvd. It also moves the agricultural area north of Novato from District 5 into District 4.

Map 201 is intended to presents some options available during this once in a decade exercise.





We appreciate the Board and staff's attention to fair representation in redrawing the lines, and hope this will be reflected in your final map. Thank you.





